Aiding our Community

Starting in June, some congregation volunteers and I will begin an effort to learn more about the inner ‘happenings’ of the Cannon Falls community and its surrounding area.

Why is doing this important? Well, let me tell you the primary reason: Oftentimes, certain needs of people in a given locale are not readily apparent—we might say those needs are ‘flying below the radar’. And, to make matters worse, help in meeting those needs sometimes is simply not available within the community.

A huge part of our calling as followers of Jesus is to care for our neighbors. But if we people of First English Lutheran Church are going to provide care to others, we need to know specifically what kinds of care are needed. Once we’ve identified those needs, then we can begin to figure out strategies to make a positive difference in the lives of those who also call the Cannon Falls area home. Ultimately, the next settled pastor at First English will help lead the charge to design the outreach plans to address these needs.



The Cannon Falls Food Shelf, which operates out of our church’s basement, is a wonderful example of the kind of community care I’m referring to. Prior to 1981, individuals and families in need of food in the Cannon Falls area did not have any resources dedicated to providing food outside of government food stamps programs. Receiving governmental assistance was often cumbersome and reserved only for those who met specific criteria. Many hungry people were left with no organized group to which to turn.

Realizing that food insecurity was more prevalent in the Cannon Falls area than previously known, in 1981 a group of First English people led by Pastor Boyd Nelson began what eventually grew into the community-wide food shelf that we know today in 2022. A significant need in the Cannon Falls area that was ‘flying under the radar’—namely, a lack of food for some households—was met by people dedicated to following Jesus’ command to love their neighbors.

So, are there similar situations occurring today in 2022, where people have particular needs for which there is no specific aid available in our community? Or are there some anticipated future needs of which we need to be aware? Well, that’s the kind of information we will be attempting to find out this summer. And armed with that info, it will enable our next pastor to carry-on and expand the fantastic outreach work already happening at First English.

Remember: First English has a storied history of helping, of which you all should be very proud. But know this—the best days of this congregation are still yet to come. The work we will be doing during this interim time will set the groundwork for that.

Personal Benefits of Stewardship

Today's consumer-driven culture can pull us in all sorts of directions when it comes to our financial resources. Should we spend? Save? Give? How much? To whom? For what?

First let's examine this word, steward. It's a word that has been on a decline in usage in the English language since the 1800s. Its most common usage today describes the position of a person who works on a ship or airplane, serving the passengers. Side note: On airlines, it's more proper these days to use the term flight attendant.

However in the Bible, when we are told to be a good steward, it's not telling us to sign up as housekeeping staff on a boat. The word, steward, most closely correlates in modern English to manager. The "managers" mentioned in scripture were often like managers in today's world – overseeing accounts, households, and businesses. So, whenever we see the word "steward" we can replace it with the biblical synonym, manager.

What is a good steward of God? A good biblical steward is always mindful that he or she works for God. God is the owner. "The earth is the LORD's and all that is in it, the world, and those who live in it." (Psalm 24:1).

Good stewards take care of the gifts God has given them to manage. So, what will we be held accountable for? We have been made stewards of the things of earth – such as money, tangible things, and even people, including ourselves.

Looking at the virtue of good stewardship can help put all things money in a faith-centered perspective—not being controlled by money, but rather controlling it, and in so doing, make better use of the gifts that God gives. Here are some examples:

Options. When we practice good stewardship, carefully prioritizing our budget and wisely spending and saving money, we open up options for ourselves and our loved ones. Further education, helping those who are in need, getting through a time of financial challenge – these situations and others are more open to us when we are monetarily mindful.

Impact. The better we manage our financial resources, the greater an impact we can have on causes and personal



situations that need our help. As we consider the impact of our giving – for what and to whom we will give – we can focus our generosity so we make the best possible use of our monetary gifts.

Relaxation. Although it can be hard work, and requires constant vigilance, good stewardship gives us control over one of the main causes of daily stress: money. The less financial stress there is in marriages, families, churches, and elsewhere, the more we can relax and better enjoy and share God's comfort, creation, and unconditional love.

Bottom-line—When we invest in others and share God's word, we grow his Kingdom. Your giving is another resource that can be used to help further the greater calling in loving others and sharing the gospel.

Thank You for our 6-9th Grade Ministry

The people of God at First English are filled with the Holy Spirit, as evidenced by the wonderful way they engaged with sixth through ninth graders on Wednesday nights. This past year, a total of 42 youths in grades six through nine participated in our Connections or Confirmation classes, meeting on 27 Wednesdays. Each week included a pizza meal, lesson, and worship service. We took a moment to add up the time that our people of God helped behind the scenes doing God's work.

135 Hours for Planning Pizza Meals: Jayme Miller coordinated the weekly meal, ordering pizza, purchasing beverages, and more. If we estimate 2.5 adults were here each week for 27 weeks to set up, serve, and clean up, pizza servers represent 135 hours of people of God doing God's work. Youths, when asked about their favorite part of Wednesday nights, often quickly say, "The pizza." What happens when we serve pizza? Our youths get fed, and as they say, "The pizza is good." Deeper than the food, youths also develop relationships with their peers and caring adults. We thank these volunteers for following Jesus' lead and sharing a meal.

266 Hours as Small Group Guides: Six through ninth grades each had two adults serve as small group guides. Small group guides dug deeper into the lessons presented by Pastor Phil, Kris Kincaid, and Jen Kooistra, helping youths connect to their daily lives. Thank you to our small group guides - Lynn Albers, Kris Kincaid, Jeremy Irrthum, Beth McGeough, Matt Montgomery, Laura Rezac, Denise Holz, and Nicole Holz for sharing your talents in God's work!

496 Hours as Adult Mentors: 7-9th grade students invited a caring adult to attend Mentor Night one Wednesday each month. Through a meal, lesson, and worship service these people of God see faith through the eyes of another generation and create special relationships between youth and adults. These 496 hours show how God's love grows as we do God's work.

179 Hours as High School Mentors: High school youth were invited to mentor sixth graders on our Wednesday Mentor nights. High school mentors hold a valued role in our faith community, remind us God calls all ages, and build caring relationships with younger youth. This year ten high school youth participated. The energy and kindness expressed in these relationships is God's goodness doing God's work.

We thank God for the many ways you shared the gift of the Holy Spirit in Children, Youth, and Family Ministry this past year, and for urging us to carry on the mission and ministry of Jesus Christ. Next month we will be looking at our Children's Ministry (students in pre-k through grade 5) and acknowledging those people who helped with these ministries.

Approved agenda. **Approved** April 7, 2022, Council minutes.

Pastor's Report:

1. Distributed Director of Children, Youth, and Family Ministry job description.
2. Reported that 5 people have agreed to serve on Transition Team, with one more to be added.
3. Step 1 for Transition Team is discerning what is going on in community. Team members planning 24 interviews with local contacts over the summer.
4. Step 2 for Transition Team is discerning pulse of congregation. Distributed information on CAT (congregation assessment tool) as possible way to do this. CAT is an 86 question online assessment completed by members of congregation (16 years and older) that helps determine the congregation's current vitality, priorities of where congregations wants to head, areas that need immediate attention, and congregation's culture.
5. Step 3 for Transition Team is to complete the Ministry Site Profile (MSP), hopefully by end of September.

Approved \$900 funds from Call Process Fund, for CAT program if Transition Team wants to use it.

Approved creating Call Process Fund of \$4,000, using \$1,800 from Goodhue County CARES Grant and \$2,200 from Federal Stimulus claim.

We need approximately \$24,000 in general fund income each month if all expenses come in as budgeted. We still have a credit balance at the Gas Company so for the next couple months. We have the General Fund Reserve and the CARES Grant to help us keep in the black if offerings fall short of expenses. As of April, the pledges received for Building Expenses, Benevolence, and Rooted in Faith are ahead of the amounts that were budgeted. The Youth account continues to be in good shape. The balance of the undesignated Lenten/Easter memorials is \$4,785.91, which the council will need to designate. The Federal Stimulus Employee Retention Credit claim of \$52,875.66 was received in May.

1. Constitution and bylaws review: D. Johnson and D. Kautz: have converted Synod a copy of our congregation's official constitution (1994) into Word document (thanks to Kathy Ehlers) and are proofing for mistakes.
2. **Approved** written job description for Director of Children, Youth, and Family Ministry. Council agreed to 2-week overlap (K. Kincaid departure and new person's arrival) if possible.

New Business

1. **Declined** request from Boy Scout Troop to install "Little Food Pantry" on church property. M. Miller will respond, listing council's concerns (confusion with Food Shelf, on-going upkeep).
2. **Approved** \$3,000 to Good Samaritan Account and \$4,000 to Madagascar Mission Fund, using \$4,785.91 from undesignated Lenten/Easter memorials and \$2,214.09 from RIF-Mission Fund.

Committee Reports

1. **Approved** hiring Bill's Blacktopping to fill cracks and seal coat parking lot at cost of \$8,800, funds from RIF-Building Endowment.

HEALTH & SAFETY MINISTRY

Staying Safe from Falls at Home

“I tripped over the cat.” My foot got caught in the rug.” These are the two most frequent comments I heard from patients over the years as I admitted them to the emergency room with a fractured hip, or shoulder, or arm. And then there was always the “I lost my balance going down the stairs.” According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC), falls are the leading cause of injury among older adults. The most common places for falling in the home are:

Living room-31%, Bedroom-30%, Kitchen-19%,
Bathroom 13%, Hallways 10%

Fortunately, with a little planning and decluttering, most at home falls are preventable. Here is a room-by-room rundown of quick and simple steps to take to prevent from falling at home.

Bathroom

- put non-slip rubber mats or self-stick strips on the floor of the tub or shower.
- consider installing grab bars for support getting in or out of the tub or shower, and if you mostly shower think about using a shower chair.

Bedroom

- use bright light bulbs and place lamps within reach.
- use nightlights to be able to see a path in the dark or consider using a battery-operated lantern or flashlight when getting up in the night.

Kitchen

- put frequently used items and utensils within reaching distance.
- consider using a stepstool for hard-to-reach items-DO NOT stand on a chair.

Floors and Common Spaces

- keep objects off the floor and out of high-traffic areas.

- remove unnecessary rugs or tape them down.
- coil or tape cords and wires next to the wall out of the way.
- arrange furniture in a way that keeps space as open as possible.

Stairs and Steps

- make sure carpet is attached or remove carpet and attach non-slip rubber treads.
- repair any broken handrails; use handrails and watch where you are walking.
- do not carry too many things down the stairs at once, and use handrails when carrying items down the stairs.
- have good lighting in the stairway and do not ascend or descend the stairs too fast.
